LOU PAVLOVICH District Nominations Tucson, Arizona

Lou Pavlovich has had an unusual love/hate relationship with roses for the past 20 years. When he began growing roses shortly after marrying his wife, Diane, he planted a rose garden of five plants in the yard just for her. He

prepared the soil meticulously with a heavy dose of steer manure which steamed from the package because it was so hot. In addition, he threw in super phosphate and several other items which allowed his tomato plants to grow into monsters.

A funny thing happened after planting bare root roses in those carefully prepared holes ... death. No growth ever came out of the plants. Even worse, his wife began laughing at his rose growing skills. His wonderful mother in law even got into the act and called Lou "The Charles Manson of Rose Growers."

The gauntlet was thrown in front of Lou. He learned about The Rose Society of Tucson, quickly joined, and read every article and book he could about growing these plants. After preparing the soil correctly this time, he planted 20-30 roses and was hooked on the hobby ever since. He then began entering rose shows, called exhibitors from around the nation to hone his skills, and eventually became a judge.

In 20 years of rose growing, he has been heavily involved in his hobby. Lou is currently an ARS Horticulture Judge, Consulting Rosarian, is past president of The Rose Society of Tucson, was Consulting Rosarian chairman of the Pacific Southwest District, Roses In Review Chairman of the PSWD, and was a member of the Product Evaluation Committee with the American Rose Society.

Lou has had a maximum of 250 roses growing in his Tucson home mainly made up of hybrid teas with a few minis and floribundas.





LEAH WATTERBERG Parliamentarian

Albuquerque, New Mexico

Leah began growing roses in 1947 in Minnesota. After moving to Albuquerque she joined the Albuquerque Rose Society and American Rose Society in 1954. She grows about 450 roses of all types. She

became an accredited rose judge in 1959, the year of her first national convention in Kansas City. She was president of the Albuquerque Rose Society for three terms, spearheading the establishment of the public rose garden in 1962. She served on the National Committees for Judging, Classification, chairman of the Program Services, beginning the slide contest, and was the elected-at-large member of the Nominating Committee. Leah received the Outstanding Rosarian Award in 1963, the Silver Honor Medal in 1977, the Outstanding Judge Award in 1982, and the Bronze Medal in 1996. Leah loves working on rose shows and enjoys judging, but doesn't exhibit as much now since her main interest was showing people new types and varieties, and others do that now.



KITTY BELENDEZ

Editor & Education Director Santa Clarita, California

Kitty Belendez has been a member of the ARS since 1985. She is currently President of the Los Angeles Rose Society, and was co-founder (1992) and past-president of the Santa Clarita Valley

Rose Society, and will return as President of SCVRS in 2001. Kitty and her husband Bob were awarded dual ARS Bronze Medals from both of these rose societies for outstanding volunteer service. They grow 350 roses of all types and exhibit at about 12 shows each year. Kitty is a Horticultural Rose Judge and Consulting Rosarian.

Well known for her editing and writing skills, Kitty was editor of the quarterly ARS publication *Rose Exhibitors' Forum* from 1994 through 1997 and was awarded the ARS Presidential Citation for her exceptional performance. Kitty served on the ARS Publications Committee and the ARS Editorial Advisory Committee from 1998 through 2000. She has also served nine years as editor of the Santa Clarita Valley Rose Society's gold medal award-winning bulletin *Rose Ecstasy*.



ROBERT B. MARTIN, JR.

Consulting Rosarians Pasadena, California

Robert B. Martin, Jr. has been growing roses for over 28 years. He currently resides in Pasadena where he grows about 400 roses of all types. Bob is the current Editor of the American

Rose Society quarterly publication Rose Exhibitors' Forum and serves as Regional Editor of Horizon Roses. He is a frequent contributor to The Rose Parade, the newsletter of the Los Angeles Rose Society and was previously the Editor of the award-winning Pasadena Rose. He is also a frequent contributor to the American Rose magazine and the American Rose Annual. Bob is a frequent lecturer at ARS National and District Conventions, and at rose societies throughout California and the U.S. He is an ARS Consulting Rosarian, an Accredited Horticultural Judge and an Accredited Arrangements Judge. He has served as a member of The American Rose Editorial Advisory Committee, and as PetRose@aol.com has served on the ARS On-Line Committee. At the local society level he is currently First Vice-President and Show Chairman of the Los Angeles Rose Society. He is also a past President and was for many years a director of the Pasadena Rose Society, which awarded him the ARS Bronze Medal in 1995. Bob is an active rose exhibitor and has won trophies at the National, District and local levels.

Roses in Review Mesa, Arizona

Dona Inglish is a native of Arizona and has lived in the Mesa area for 18 years. She has six children, three

grandchildren and works as a mortgage broker. Since starting her rose garden in January 1995, she has acquired over 500 roses of all types. This rapid growth has come in part because of enjoying exhibiting and experimenting with new varieties and ideas. Included in the assortment are about 65 hybrid teas on fortuniana rootstock. Awards have been received for exhibiting on the local, district and national level, but winning Best Horticulture in local shows has been most fulfilling.

Historian Las Vegas, Nevada

I started growing roses in 1982, became a member of the Las Vegas Valley Rose Society and the American Rose Society soon after. I was a sometime member of both

groups until 1990 when I became a Life Member. I began as most people seem to do, with a small garden of hybrid teas, when I ran out of room I started with minis, in pots. In about 1988, I started with OGRs, buying 5 plants that were alleged to be eligible for Dowager Queen from Roses Of Yesterday & Today. Those also wound up in pots, and survived their first summer that way, and I've never dug another hole. When I moved in 1998 all the roses went with me. They are still in pots, on a drip system, waiting for holes. There were 984 roses in pots in 1996, the last year that I bothered to count. I buy more roses every time I travel or see roses for sale, so the guess was that I moved over 1000 roses to my new house. I now have almost half an acre, recently built a 125' x 5' raised bed and am about to embark on planting my big roses in the bed and the ground. I have tried almost every type of drip system, all have some drawbacks, however they all keep the roses alive if I remember to hand water weekly. I work hard at finding easier ways to take care of my roses, and usually exhibit in the spring. I rarely spray; I have a garden full of birds and lizards and ladybugs and plan to order more beneficials this spring. I enjoy rose travel, conventions, buying trips and garden tours. Of all the joys this hobby has brought into my life the best are my rose friends, and that is part of why I am so pleased to be historian for the PSWD. I read a lot of your newsletters, and when I finally meet the people I've read about, I feel that I know you. I have been a CR for 8 years ... is it possible? I am Past-President & VP of LVRS, and have been District Historian since Zelda Lloyd died. Where do the years go?

Bill works as an Occupational Medicine physician.






MARYLOU COFFMAN

Arrangement Judges Niche By Kreg B. Hill

As the new Pacific Southwest **District Arrangement Judge's** Chairman, I am here to help,

educate and encourage arrangers and local societies with their Arrangement Division. My other duty will be to assist our current District Arrangement Judges to maintain their certification with the American Rose Society. During the next three years my goal is to increase the number of Accredited ARS Arrangement Judges as well as to encourage all of our district societies to include or expand their Arrangement Division in their show schedules. Another one of my goals is having Rose Arrangement Seminars and Workshops plus a Rose Arrangement Judging School.

ARS Rose Arranging is coming of age. Having just returned from judging the Fall National Rose Show in Atlanta, there were over 180 arrangement entries. Many of the attendees stated that it was a better Arrangement Show than a Horticultural Show. Currently, there are about 175 ARS Arrangement Judges and Dr. Lewis Shupe will continue to be the Chairman of Arrangement Judges. Dr. Tommy Cairns has appointed me as the new editor of the ARS Rose Arranger's Bulletin. The four quarterly issues are available from Shreveport for only \$10 per year. Hopefully, all the arrangers in this district will subscribe and will contribute articles to this publication.

All the local societies are to have their arrangement schedules for their local shows approved by the District Chairman of Arrangements prior to the publication of the schedule. This procedure was developed to ensure that there is consistency in the schedules, and the rules from the Guidelines for Judging Rose Arrangements are followed. If the *Guidelines* are not followed, the judges are unable to award the American Rose Society's Arrangement Rosettes and Certificates.

I am here to assist the local societies. If you need help writing the schedules, let me know. The technical portion of the schedules, the rules and descriptions, I can assist you. What I am unwilling to do is select your theme and think of the class titles - that's up to you, but we can go from there. Please do not copy the same schedule from year to year - that is boring to the arrangement exhibitor! Most of our societies do not have enough entries to warrant enough classes to award all of the ARS Awards. Rotate the type of classes, so that different awards may be possible. When was the last time your society had a Princess or Duchess Class? How about Junior Arrangement Award or Court of Etiquette? Every

REPORT FROM ATLANTA By Steve Jones, District Director

The ARS Fall convention in Atlanta, GA, was a lot of fun and it was well attended with over 660 registrants. There were also over 100 volunteers to help out the armies of people. Congrats to Kitsy Mostellar and Pam Denham for an excellent convention. Everyone was entertained to say the least.

The board meeting was in two parts, the old and new boards. It took 11 hours to get through all of the agenda items and elections. There were many major items for the old board. All but 4 members attended their final board meeting. The first was the ratification of Mike Kromer's contract for the next three years, which was approved as is. Next, the Consulting Rosarian and Judges Manuals were both approved. Now, the CR Manual will be proofread and Carolyn Fylling of Arvada, CO, volunteered to help with the proofreading, and once that is done, the manual will be ready to print. We expect both new manuals to be available around April 2001, and should be available to members as a pre-purchase. The new CR Manual is a major rewrite of the first edition, and contains considerably more information, graphs, and color prints of diseases, fertilizer deficiencies, and insects. The suggested price will be \$10 for just the pages, or \$15 if you want it in a new binder. The pages will fit into the current binder. The new Guidelines for Judging Roses appears to be a rewrite of the existing one, and would also run about \$10.

The most controversial subject at the convention was Howard Walters missing the 2/3rds vote needed to become the next President Emeritus by one vote. There were a lot of hard feelings and discussions about this. The other hot subject was the board approved to raise ARS dues by \$5 a year for regular memberships, and less for the other classes. We have not had a dues increase in eight years, and with our cash flow problems, it was necessary to increase the dues. The vote was tight as well, winning by one vote. There will be a special offer that if you pay for 3 years, or life, you can do so at the old price. The increase will not take affect until April 1, 2001. Also increased were life memberships to \$1000 for regular members only (not seniors).

There is no doubt that the ARS is short of cash, largely due to the monies paid to the fundraiser the board hired. It was a big mistake in the long run, so now we have to recoup the monies back. Also, it appears that the magazine now costs what we pay for it. Summer is always a tough time of the year for cash flow, and we are in better shape than a few months ago. ARS laid off all of the part time help, and deleted a few positions as well. Janice Conduff left and was replaced by Jennette Mladenka. Advertisements were also increased 2%. A new publication just listing show names was approved. This will be mostly a list of the show names in alpha order, the color class, date, and hybridizer. No other information will be provided. There were two items to bring back the classification changes that were made in Nashville as the Classification Committee violated their charter. It failed to receive a 2/3rds vote to bring it back to

the table.

Jan Shivers was pre-approved to be the new slide contest chairman. There will be 2 new sections, a winter scene or arrangement for the Christmas cards, and new members. The Calendar contest was not approved. For national rose shows, it was approved that mini-floras will be shown in a separate class, but will be eligible for mini queen, king and princess. It will be up to the local shows and districts if they want to follow suit or not. Another judge's change was the "majority of the votes" when balloting for the court is now a simple majority. In other words, if a rose gets 2 more votes than the next rose, even though it failed to get 50% or more of the vote, it will still win. For arrangements, the table arrangements will be eligible for the medal certificates. The option of an open book exam was approved for the arrangement judges exam. A new trophy was approved by the Rose Hybridizers Association for fall conventions for the best seedling by an amateur. The trophy will be a Steuben Crystal inscribed with the RHA logo.

It was announced that Jim and Anne Herring pledged \$100,000 to the Klima Fund as a planned gift. All ARS members should consider the planned gifts. You can donate a portion or all of your estate to ARS and get tax breaks now. Thanks Jim and Anne!

The new board voted in the new officers and committees. The new Executive Committee will be Tommy Cairns, Marilyn Wellan, Jeff Wyckoff, Robbie Tucker, and Marily Young. The new Judges Chair will be Ed Griffith and CR Chair will be Stan and Janet Kosidlak, who were on my committee and will do a great job! Lew Shupe, Art Emmons, and Bunny Skran will remain in their current committees: Arrangement Judges, Garden Evaluation, and Old Garden Roses, respectively. Oline Reynolds will be the new Awards and Prizes Chair and former PSWD director Sam Trivitt will be the new Bulletin Contest Chair.

The rose show was great. There were a lot of blooms, and competition was tough. In the end, SoCal's Jeff Stage won the hybrid tea King and Princess with Crystalline and Moonstone respectively, and the 3 hybrid tea blooms. Bob Martin won the mini palette. Tommy Cairns and Luis Desamero won the Lawton. The North Carolina group won a fair share of awards: Dennis and Suzy Bridges the Warwick, Steve House won his 4th in a row Millie Walters trophy. Steve is the first person in ARS history to win the same national trophy 4 years in a row, and is quickly becoming the all-time national trophy winner, if he isn't there already. The big winners were Vernon and Nancy Rickard from NC, who won the hybrid tea Queen with Signature, the Dowager with Sydonie, and the Kirk with St. Patrick. The rest of the major awards were: John Hefner of IN, won the McFarland, the Pacific was won by George Poe of TN, the Moore won by Paul and Charlotte Blankenship, the Ben Williams (mini-flora) by Bob and Sandy Lundberg, and the Overesch by Sandy Dixon of FL. Doug and Anne Baker from SC won Mini Queen with Fairhope.

As usual, the convention was well worth attending and I hope all of our PSWD members will consider going to a national or district convention in the future. The people and roses are great!





DID YOU KNOW THAT THE DISTRICT HAS A NEW WEB SITE?

Last August after the District elections were announced, I received an e-mail from Steve Jones asking if I'd like to be the new webmaster for the District. It came as quite a shock as well as an honor to be asked. Some of you may know I'm also the San Fernando Valley Rose Society's (http://www.geocities.com/sfvroses/) webmaster. The focus of a local rose society's web site is primarily on their events within the immediate geographical area. The District site I view as the hub for all the local rose societies within the District. Therefore, it should create interaction among the local societies, help new people find a society in their area and promote cultivation and exhibition of the rose.

Having traveled extensively throughout the southwest, I selected a color scheme to represent the entire Southwest. The reds and shades of yellow, orange, peach, turquoise and greens pull together the desert from West Texas, Southern New Mexico, Nevada and Arizona to the coastal regions of California and lush mountain regions of NM and AZ. So, put on your sunglasses, grab the sunscreen and let's take a quick tour of the new site.

The site map is the group of red buttons on the pages to ease navigation throughout the site. Check the "Latest Updates" button frequently to see what new items have been added. The home page itself contains a guest book and a message forum. We are going to have Consulting Rosarians answering questions as they appear in the message forum. Any volunteers? You may have also noticed a link to a VOICE/TEXT chat room. Reduce your phone bill expenses to buy roses! Use the chat box for conversations with your fellow rosarians around the district or country.

Probably one of the most important areas on this site is the "Events Calendar and Rose Show" page. There I list the upcoming rose shows for all the societies. In addition, I will either provide a link to those societies that have their show schedule posted on their web site, or I will post the show schedule right in the District site. When it's on the District site, I also provide an MS Word version of the schedule for download.

Here is where I need some help. I ask that the show chairpersons keep me informed as to their upcoming shows AND provide me with an MS Word show schedule or a link to their show schedule. I for one like to travel to other shows providing I have the schedule in advance. This should encourage exhibitors to attend other rose shows that they might otherwise have skipped.

The next most important area is the "Rose Show Results" page. Here I obviously post the results of the shows as they are provided to me. Bob Martin is terrific about getting me the show results, but in some cases he hasn't been able to obtain some show results. Therefore, I would appreciate it, if the show chairpersons would provide me a copy either e-mail or U.S. Mail so I can post the results.

I encourage all show chairpersons to have an e-mail address. It will benefit you and your rose show greatly.

Next we are trying to provide an accurate listing of all Consulting Rosarians and Judges. This can only be accomplished with the help of the local societies keeping accurate records and notifying the District and/or me of changes. There is nothing more frustrating than to have out-of-date information. Keep in mind that these people are your resources for your rose shows and rose information. Again I encourage all CR's and judges to have an e-mail address. You can view the CR's and judges pages either alphabetically or geographically by state.

For those concerned about privacy regarding their address and phone number on the web, I have provided the option so that each individual CR or judge can have either or both their street address or phone number suppressed. However, if one does wish both phone number and street address suppressed, I strongly encourage that an e-mail address be provided. Please let me know if you would like your information suppressed.

Periodic District-related information is going to be provided via e-mail so please let the District know your e-mail address. Those without e-mail will be at the mercy of U.S. Mail, which will have an impact regarding time sensitive information.

The list of "District Rose Societies" provides basic information pertaining to individual societies. I strongly recommend that the president or other officer check what I have for your society. If I don't have an accurate time and place of your society's meetings and an e-mail contact, new and interested people will probably skip over you and look elsewhere. Further, I provide a link to all district web sites. Those societies that do not have a web site are strongly encouraged to get a free site and free email. I will be more than happy to give assistance on this. SFVRS has already had visitors because they found us on the web. Today a web site is as necessary as the newsletter!

Thanks to Donna Banovich-Pybus we have public and private "Rose Gardens" with photos (if available.) This is

CONSULTING ROSARIANS

I am pleased to accept my appointment by District Director, Steve Jones, to serve as the Pacific Southwest District Chairman of Consulting Rosarians.

The Consulting Rosarian program of the American Rose Society, now in its 80th year, exists to inspire the love and appreciation of roses, their culture and exhibition. Consulting Rosarians are the ambassadors of the American Rose Society and its local societies, charged simply with the duty to share their knowledge and love of roses with anyone who is interested in learning about roses and their culture. This is something I enjoy doing and I trust that you do as well.

The Pacific Southwest District is the largest and most geographically diverse of all the ARS Districts. Its 270 Consulting Rosarians are spread throughout Southern California, Southern Nevada, Arizona, New Mexico and West Texas. Our climates and rose-growing conditions vary widely and the availability at each society level of CRs familiar with local growing conditions is important to our communities. My primary goal is to nurture our existing CRs and to expand the availability of CR services to all who are interested in roses.

This, of course, is the age of the Internet. I am pleased that we are able to attract Glenn Fiery as

District Webmaster. A complete listing of local CRs has been posted to our District website and I encourage all CRs with e-mail addresses to send them to me or Glenn so that we may list your availability to answer questions about roses posed through the Internet.

I have obtained from ARS headquarters a listing of PSWD Consulting Rosarians and am reviewing the list to determine everyone's current status. Initial plans have been laid to sponsor two CR Seminars in 2001, one in Southern California and one in Arizona. At each we will provide the opportunity for CRs to update their credentials, as well as to administer the CR test so that we might add new CRs. My objective is to see that two CR seminars are organized during each year of my term with a view to updating our rose knowledge, retaining existing CRs and adding to our ranks.

A revised *CR Manual* was approved by the ARS Board of Directors at the Atlanta National Convention. This revised manual is expected to be released in 2001 and will fit in the existing binder. The *CR Manual* is a great resource for all CRs as well as being one of the best values in the ARS. We should encourage all rosarians in the District to obtain this Manual whether or not they intend to ever become CRs.

I also encourage all CRs to remember that their designation as a Consulting Rosarian is not just an honor, but an opportunity. Let us all use that opportunity as often as possible to enthusiastically spread our love of roses. It is a good message.

Check out the "Other Rose Links" to find links to other rose societies and rose related sites, both noncommercial and commercial.

Other rose society webmasters are encouraged to link to the District pages. The site is stable now so your links should remain valid. But check them once or twice a year to be sure the page hasn't been removed or relocated. I selected this new URL specifically for longevity to continue past my term of office.

That's just an overview; there is much more to be found than what is described here. I am open to suggestions for new additions to the site. Let me hear from you!

I could not have done this site without a lot of help from others. I would like to thank particularly Steve Jones, Kitty Belendez, Dona Inglish and Susan Gregg for their extensive input and corrections. Further, I would like to thank Sam Trivitt for the information he graciously provided to me. "Roses in Review" is the ARS annual survey of rose ratings. All Consulting Rosarians are required to participate in Roses in Review. The information benefits all of us as the scores are included in the ARS Handbook for Selecting Roses. All rose growers are encouraged to participate, and do not need to be a member of the ARS.

This year, ARS had the survey on-line at their web site. It was so easy to do. I personally reviewed 24 roses in less than one half hour.

In the Pacific Southwest District there were 302 reporters who participated in Roses in Review in the year 2000. Those reporters reviewed a total of 171 varieties of roses, which represented 3024 plants. It appears that having the survey on-line helped to increase the percentage of participation.

For the years of 2001 through 2003, the Roses in Review Coordinator will be Dona Inglish. All rosarians in the Pacific Southwest District will again be asked to participate.

Look for the national RIR report in the January ARS Magazine.
